

Hawaii Pacific University 2nd Annual Capstone Symposium

The 2014 HPU Capstone Symposium showcases undergraduate and graduate students' competency, creativity, and innovation in their discipline areas and their abilities to relate discipline-specific learning outcomes to real world applications.

Capstone experience is defined as experience that integrates coursework, knowledge, skills and experiential learning to enable the student to demonstrate a broad mastery of learning across the curriculum for further career advancement. Capstone experiences link students' knowledge and abilities to future employment or higher education and substantiate professional development and achievement.

Examples of capstone experience includes culminating senior experiences, achievement portfolio, senior project, thesis, comprehensive examination, practicum, internship, field experience, co-op experience, clinical assignment, and study abroad. Capstone experience takes the form of a capstone course or is spread out in several courses in a degree program. HPU's Capstone Symposium highlights the importance of capstone experiences in higher education.



HPU's Capstone Symposium promotes academic excellence, learning with real-world purposes, interdisciplinary exchanges, and HPU-community connection.

The Capstone Symposium provides presenters opportunities to:

- share what they have accomplished in their degree program
- showcase their competency, creativity, and innovation in certain areas
- *relate* discipline-specific learning outcomes to real world applications
- *link* their knowledge and abilities to future employment or higher education
- substantiate professional development and achievement

- what HPU students can accomplish by the time they graduate
- what different degree programs can offer
- how HPU contributes to the local community and the world
